FOREWORD BY THE CHAIRMAN OF THE PARTNERSHIP



Over the last ten years, since the introduction of Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnerships across England and Wales, our local partnership has made great progress towards making sure that levels of crime in Fareham remain low and the area is a safe place for residents and visitors alike.

Through a focussed approach to tackling the priorities that have been identified and as a result of strong information sharing between the community and the agencies, Fareham's Community Safety Partnership has had the hard-earned honour of being one of the few Partnerships across the country that has reached its goal to reduce crime by fifteen percent. Incidents of 'criminal damage', such as damage to cars or garden fences, have shown a particular downward trend with a reduction by twenty one percent of reported cases since 2006. 'Acquisitive crime' (or burglary and vehicle theft) has shown a huge decrease with a fifteen percent drop in burglary offences in the period from 2006 to 2007. Echoing these improvements, our communities continue to feel safe with 96 percent of those responding to the 2007 Annual Residents' Survey stating that they were satisfied with the borough as a safe and healthy place to live and work.

The setting up of Joint Agency Action Groups in areas where long-term issues have been identified has provided the opportunity for residents, Councillors, community groups, schools and churches to work together with the agencies 'responsible' for reducing crime, allowing many different solutions to be considered. Through the work of these Action Groups a new youth facility was supported to open in the Highlands area and timed lighting is being installed at Locks Heath Skate Park to develop an appropriate and safe place for young people to gather.

Whilst we are proud of our achievements, we are clear that progress has and can only be made through keeping our focus on the crime and disorder that has the greatest impact on our communities. Fareham's Community Safety Plan 2008-2011 highlights the types of crime we know are important to local residents and clearly states what action we, as a partnership, will take to make sure they are tackled.

Fareham's Community Safety Partnership has shown that this joined-up approach works well at reducing crime and disorder. Over the next year we will continue to listen to our communities, develop our partnership working practices and deliver this Plan to keep crime and disorder across Fareham low.

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1. Introduction

1.1 Fareham's Community Safety Plan 2008-11

This plan sets out how Fareham's Community Safety Partnership has identified the key priorities that the Partnership will focus on in 2008 to 2011 to make the biggest impact on crime and disorder across Fareham. It goes on to explain how the partners will work both together and with the community to tackle these priorities. The plan highlights specific actions that will be undertaken to make sure that improvements in these areas are achieved, and lists how progress will be measured.

1.2 Purpose of the Plan

The Crime and Disorder Act of 1998 required that the police and local authorities work together with other agencies as a partnership to tackle crime and disorder in their local area. Specifically, these 'Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnerships' were required to carry out audits of crime, disorder and substance misuse on a three year cycle and develop strategies to tackle priority areas of concern in response to these findings.

In 2006 the Home Office, having conducted a review of the work of Partnerships across the country, issued a set of national standards to promote the adoption of certain effective practices into partnership working. In particular, the requirement to conduct a three-yearly audit and strategy was to be replaced by directions to undertake a review of patterns of crime and disorder, known as a 'strategic assessment', and develop a corresponding 'community safety plan' for the following three years. A six-monthly refresh of the strategic assessment will allow Partnerships to monitor progress against targets and make a revision of priorities possible. This revised process was to make sure that strategies reflect up-to-date priorities and include the latest identified best practice to tackle crime and disorder.

In November of 2007, Fareham's Community Safety Partnership carried out its first strategic assessment, the findings and identified actions from which form the basis of this plan.

1.3 Fareham's Community Safety Partnership

Fareham's Community Safety Partnership was formed ten years ago in response to the Crime and Disorder Act 1998, and is Fareham's nominated Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership. It is made up of a number of agencies and organisations, not only statutory but also

voluntary and community, who work in partnership to tackle crime across the Borough of Fareham.

The organisations with named responsibility to develop Fareham's Community Safety Plan are:-

- Fareham Borough Council
- Hampshire County Council
- Hampshire Constabulary
- Hampshire Police Authority
- Hampshire Primary Care Trust
- Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service

In addition, key agencies who contribute to the work of the Partnership include:-

- Hampshire Drug and Alcohol Action Team
- Wessex Youth Offending Team
- National Probation Service
- Fareham and Gosport Drug and Alcohol Reference Group
- Many local voluntary sector, community groups and educational partners who provide invaluable links and means of delivering actions on the ground.

1.4 Links to other plans

Just as Fareham's Community Safety Partnership believes in working co-operatively and bringing agencies together, it also recognises that its priorities and actions cross over into other areas of work covered by other partnerships and key organisations. The Partnership continually checks how it can align with, reflect or support all other relevant strategies and plans.

The Community Safety Partnership is a member of Networkfareham, Fareham's Local Strategic Partnership, which produces a long term strategy for the Borough covering all aspects of life. This 'Sustainable Community Strategy' which is currently being updated aims to achieve improvements in economic, social and environmental well being for everyone in the borough.

One of the Sustainable Community Strategy's key visions for 2009-2020 is that communities of Fareham will 'feel safer', and as a well established partnership Fareham's Community Safety Partnership accepts responsibility for delivering against the relevant objectives identified by Networkfareham.

2. Review of previous strategy

2.1 Previous priorities

Fareham's Community Safety Partnership's last audit of crime and disorder was carried out in 2004 and the resulting Community Safety Strategy covered the period 2005-2008, under the former three-yearly cycle. The audit identified that the main areas of concern for Fareham at that time were 'acquisitive crime' (or burglary and vehicle crime), 'anti-social behaviour', including criminal damage and arson, 'illegal drugs' and 'alcohol misuse'.

The Strategy also highlighted the need to focus on the key themes of reducing residents' fear of crime, working with young people, involving the community and reducing re-offending in order to have the greatest impact on the levels of crime and disorder in Fareham.

2.2 Achievements and progress

Since the Partnership's establishment in 1998, it has continued to make progress towards reducing Fareham's crime levels. Over the last three years in particular, with the adoption of an increasingly targeted way of working and the introduction of Neighbourhood Policing Teams, a notable decrease can be seen in the numbers of incidents reported for the majority of Fareham's key crime categories on which the Partnership's performance is judged.

As far as progress against the 2005-2008 Community Safety Strategy priorities are concerned, burglary and theft of motor vehicles have reduced throughout this time, continuing to fall by fifteen percent and thirty five percent respectively between 2006 and 2007.

Levels of reported anti-social behaviour have shown a dramatic increase since 2005, with vehicle nuisance being highlighted as a particular issue. However, it is important to note that during this timeframe ways in which residents can report incidents of anti-social behaviour have also developed and some of this trend may reflect increased reporting rates. Also of interest is that although reports of anti-social behaviour have heightened, incidents of criminal damage, one of the sub-categories, have reduced by twenty one percent between 2006 and 2007.

Although drugs and alcohol offences for Fareham have risen alongside national trends, many projects have been developed over the last three years which demonstrate effective partnership working in this field and

are just beginning to provide benefits. These and other relevant Partnership achievements are listed below:-

- The commissioning of the Peninsula Project, a jointly funded project with Gosport Borough Council to support and reduce the risk to society from prolific offenders.
- The introduction of a Borough-wide alcohol control area to reduce the impact of street drinking on the community.
- The development of a Pubwatch scheme for licensed premises to encourage best practice and share information and banning policies on problem drinkers.
- The adoption of a strong multi-agency tasking and co-ordinating group which identifies local community safety issues on a fortnightly basis and makes sure problem areas get the resources they need to secure improvement.
- The development of Joint Agency Action Groups, or multi-agency problem-solving forums, to identify long-term solutions to areas that have experienced long-standing crime and disorder issues.
- The adoption of First Reprimand Clinics which provide both support and deterrent for young people who have been identified as being involved in persistent low-level anti-social behaviour.
- The securing of two workers employed by the Youth Offending Team to work with the younger age groups (8-13 years) who are classed as 'at risk of offending'.
- The running of Local Intervention Fire Education (LIFE) courses at Fareham Fire Station to develop responsible attitudes to fire whilst addressing the consequences of anti-social behaviour.
- The running of two youth activity events over summer to offer young people the opportunity to link into positive activities.

Many of these projects were made possible by funding received by the Partnership through the Home Office, enabling the Partnership to support key posts and act swiftly to address community safety issues as they arose.

3. Summary of the strategic assessment

3.1 Main issues identified in the strategic assessment

Fareham's Community Safety Partnership undertook their first strategic assessment in 2007. Data from the Police and Home Office's performance management processes, the 101 non-emergency telephone line records, the results of the Council's Annual Residents' Survey and feedback from Community Action Team meetings, among much, was collected and analysed. From this, a detailed report was written which showed current patterns of crime and disorder across the Borough of Fareham and evaluated the direction of trends. Crime types which revealed persistently high numbers of incidents, were

notably increasing in number or seriousness or had been shown to be of consistent concern to the residents of Fareham were highlighted as priority areas.

The five current priority areas identified by the strategic assessment have been identified as:-

- criminal damage, including arson
- anti-social behaviour
- violent crime
- drugs and alcohol misuse
- and reducing re-offending, which links into each of the previous four categories.

3.2 The Partnership's Vision

Fareham's Community Safety Partnership's mission statement is:-

'To promote community safety in order to improve the quality of life for residents and ensure Fareham remains a safe place in which to live, work and visit.'

This will be achieved through a set of objectives linked to each of the priorities.

3.3 Developing the Plan

The Plan sets out how the Partnership will achieve its vision and tackle priorities so results can be clearly linked to the work undertaken. In addition to these locally identified priorities, Partnerships are also set national targets to meet which are underpinned with 'performance indicators', or data on which our progress will be judged. These 'Public Sector Agreement' targets can range from anything from the 'PSA 23', or Making Communities Safer, delivery agreement to 'PSA 21', or Build More Cohesive, Empowered and Active Communities.

To make delivery easier to plan and avoid the duplication of targets, the Home Office is currently working on the development of a common performance framework which is due to be introduced in April 2008. Any performance targets identified by this process will need to be incorporated in the work of Fareham's Community Safety Partnership over the coming year.

3.4 Under-pinning themes

Delivery of the Plan is under-pinned by the Partnerships commitment to three key themes. Firstly, effective working can only be guaranteed if the agencies within the Community Safety Partnership have access to

a detailed picture of the issues affecting an area. For this reason, we are fully committed to developing our links with local communities and listening to the concerns of residents.

The second way in which we will make sure time and effort goes to areas or problems where the greatest impact can be made is by identifying these priority areas through analysis of evidence, using both the information we have received from communities and the records of incidents maintained by the Police.

Finally, we realise that not only does effective action need to be taken to reduce the identified problems but it is essential that the local community need to be kept informed of this progress.

4. Tackling the priorities

4.1 Criminal Damage, including Arson

Issues

This type of crime has seen numbers of incidents across Fareham drop significantly in 2006 to 2007. Despite this, the criminal damage committed in this time has been estimated to cost a total of £2,824,140 in repairs and cost to victims. Add to this the fact that this category accounts for twenty five percent of all Fareham's crime and it is easy to see why one of Fareham's Community Safety Partnership's aims for 2008 to 2009 is to reduce criminal damage and arson through partnership working.

What we want to do to achieve a reduction in Criminal Damage and Arson

Objective 1

Limit the opportunities for criminal damage and arson to be committed

Actions

- 1.1 Improve public awareness of crime prevention measures through a minimum of two targeted media campaigns and visits to all repeat victims.
- 1.2 The Fire Service's Community Liaison Officer will conduct 50 Environmental Visual Audits across the borough in partnership with other agencies to limit arson risks.

- 1.3 To develop inter-departmental training with the Council's Department of Planning to promote the principles of 'Designing Out Crime' in the planning process.
- 1.4 Work with each secondary school in Fareham to schedule in a minimum of one community safety education session.
- 1.5 Conduct multi-agency crime prevention patrols during periods associated with high levels of criminal damage.
- 1.6 **Objective 2**

Identify key locations and offenders

- 2.1 Every criminal damage offence will be investigated by at least a Police Community Support Officer.
- 2.2 Develop a procedure to ensure the robust tasking of CCTV operators and equipment through the Community Tasking and Co-ordinating Group, through hotspots identified by the Data Analyst.
- 2.3 Information sharing practices to be increased through promoting links with Neighbourhood Watch, Pub Watch and Shop Watch.

Objective 3

Respond quickly to incidents to reduce fear of crime

- 3.1 Safer Neighbourhood Team to visit victims of criminal damage within 48 hours of initial complaint.
- 3.2 Develop procedures to promote swift repairs and graffiti removal through joint-agency working.
- 3.3 All agencies to support the Joint Agency Action Groups to develop and implement long term solutions.
- 3.4 Develop a clear partnership media message on how to report crime.
- 3.5 Develop a system to improve the reporting and prevention of crime by all departments of the Council.

Objective 4

Encourage principles of reparation

- 4.1 Work with local community groups to develop reparation projects and increase volunteer capacity.
- 4.2 Develop principles of reparation and parental responsibility in the Caution Clinics.
- 4.3 Work in partnership with the Magistrates Court to promote the use of principles of reparation in sentencing.

4.2 Anti-Social Behaviour

Issues

The term Anti-Social Behaviour embraces many different types of behaviour including, young people and/or adults being rude and abusive, disputes with neighbours, loud music, graffiti, street drinking and illegal fly tipping. Fareham's Community Safety Partnership recognises the negative impact Anti-Social Behaviour can have on the quality of life for the residents of Fareham and the Fear of Crime.

Reports of anti-social behaviour have increased by ninety six percent over the last sixteen months, with the greatest increase seen in those reporting anti-social or nuisance driving. Fareham's residents also ranked 'teenagers hanging around on streets' as one of the top problems in the 2007 Residents Survey.

What we want to do to achieve a reduction in Anti-Social Behaviour

Objective 1

Respond to identified community priorities

- 1.1 Develop tasking procedures with all partner agencies to tackle priorities identified through Community Action Team meetings, Police and Councillor's surgeries.
- 1.2 Develop active member participation of Joint Agency Action Groups, the Community Tasking and Co-ordinating Group and Community Safety Partnership meetings.
- 1.3 Identified neighbourhood priorities to be fed into future strategic assessments by logging community priority forms.

Objective 2

Tackle anti-social driving pro-actively

- 2.1 Conduct a minimum of 4 anti-social driving operations within the year.
- 2.2 Run 6 'Teenage Road Accident Prevention Training' (TRAPT) courses and promote referrals from all agencies through information sharing of individuals linked to anti-social driving.
- 2.3 Continue to promote information sharing to enable the sending of anti-social driving warning letters.
- 2.4 Engage with car park owners to identify potential design alterations to prevent anti-social driving.
- 2.5 Deploy the Mobile Static Speed Limit Reminders to the most effective locations by using the Community TCG tasking system.
- 2.6 Work locally to ensure the robust enforcement of parking regulations and problem solve hotspots.

Objective 3

Support and develop diversionary projects for young people

- 3.1 Evaluate existing youth provision across Fareham and identify need.
- 3.2 Support the provision and development of youth work in targeted areas.
- 3.3 Develop a programme of events for young people in the borough of Fareham.
- 3.4 Work with partner agencies to address issues with volunteer capacity linked with the delay in the CRB process and promote volunteering in youth work.

Objective 4

Early identification and management of offenders

- 4.1 Promote the use of intelligence feedback forms by all partner agencies.

- 4.2 The development of a procedure to ensure the robust tasking of CCTV operators and equipment.
- 4.3 Improve information sharing and increase referrals to YISP by 100 percent.

Objective 5

Support enforcement action and deter offending

- 5.1 Continue to hold and develop best practice for First Reprimand Clinics.
- 5.2 Conduct warning visits in areas identified as suffering from anti-social behaviour by groups or individuals, as tasked by the Community TCG.
- 5.3 Amend Acceptable Behaviour Contracts to include parental responsibility clauses.
- 5.4 Develop inter-departmental and inter-agency training around best practice with regards to dealing with anti-social behaviour.
- 5.5 Develop collaborative joint working between the Council's Enforcement Officers, the Accredited Community Safety Officers and the Police Community Support Officers through the Community Tasking and Co-ordinating Group.

Objective 6

Tackle community perceptions of anti-social behaviour

- 6.1 Develop a media strategy with key messages to promote the successes of community safety projects and actions by all agencies.

4.3 Violent Crime

Issues

In 2006 to 2007 violent crime accounted for twenty six percent of overall crime across the borough, with the majority of incidents taking place in and around the Town Centre. Supporting this, a report written by the Police also showed West Street in Fareham as the place where the greatest number of violent offences occurs across Fareham, Gosport, Havant and Winchester.

Reported domestic violence has also risen by twenty five percent in the last three years and as a result, violent crime appears in our priority list.

What we want to do to reduce Violent Crime in Fareham

Objective 1

Develop strategies to identify 'hot spot' areas and tackle violent crime

- 1.1 Work pro-actively with the owners and managers of licensed premises to prevent alcohol related violent crime, by identifying triggers and changing behaviour that underpins the violent behaviour.
- 1.2 Ensure strong sharing of information between enforcement agencies and healthcare professionals
- 1.3 Zero tolerance of violent crime by the Police.
- 1.4 Work with licensed premises to increase the use of polycarbonate glasses in Fareham Town Centre.

Objective 2

Improve the effectiveness of multi-agency working in the field of domestic abuse

- 2.1 Promote sharing of best practice and understanding of agencies through the Domestic Abuse Forum by revising the format of the Forum.
- 2.2 Each housing provider in Fareham to update their tenancy agreements to include a clause about not tolerating domestic abuse.
- 2.3 Review the attendance of the Multi Agency Risk Assessment Clinics to ensure effective sharing of individuals of concern and tasking of actions to reduce risks.

Objective 3

Improve support mechanisms and structures for victims and perpetrators of domestic abuse

- 3.1 Secure the continuation of the domestic abuse alarm installation scheme.
- 3.2 Ensure development of the most efficient and effective sign-posting service for victims of domestic abuse.

- 3.3 Develop two media campaigns per year around empowering and informing victims of domestic abuse.
- 3.4 Evaluate the current impact of Domestic Abuse floating support with the aim of investigating joint funding for the most effective service.
- 3.5 Develop best practice guidance for responding to individuals presenting with domestic abuse issues.

4.4 Drugs and Alcohol Misuse

Issues

Drugs related offences that were reported across Fareham showed a forty nine percent increase in the last eighteen months, with cannabis being named in a large majority of these complaints. In addition to this, public drinking has become a significant problem for residents with 21 percent of respondents to the 2007 Residents' Survey stating that they saw drunken or rowdy behaviour in public places as a big or very big problem.

There is a clear link between crime and drug addiction, with ninety five percent of top-level offenders being identified as being drugs or alcohol dependant

What we will do to reduce alcohol and drugs related offences across Fareham

Objective 1

Reduce substance misuse related crime and associated anti-social behaviour through partnership work

- 1.1 Through the Licensing process, educate businesses involved in supplying alcohol and robustly enforce licensing conditions.
- 1.2 Conduct a minimum of 4 operations through out the year to enforce the Designated Public Place Order.
- 1.3 Conduct a minimum of test purchase operations on off-licenses.
- 1.4 With other districts in the County, identify and fund the most effective Prolific and Priority Offenders scheme and align with the Drug Intervention Programme.

Objective 2

Raise awareness of the risks associated with alcohol

- 2.1 Work with each secondary school across the borough to schedule in a minimum of one community safety session per year.
- 2.2 Produce partnership leaflets aimed at informing parents of the risks to their children from drinking alcohol.
- 2.3 Expand the provision of Parent Information Packs to all Year 9 parents' evenings.

Objective 3

Promote the exchange of information regarding individuals associated with alcohol and drugs misuse

- 3.1 Develop attendance of appropriate agencies at the 'PPO JAAG'.
- 3.2 Promote the use of intelligence feedback forms by all partner agencies.
- 3.3 Develop practices between anti-social behaviour services and the drugs agenda by updating the Anti-Social Behaviour Referral form.
- 3.4 Run a multi-agency workshop on the sharing of information around individuals associated with alcohol and drugs misuse.

5. Delivery and Evaluation

The Community Safety Plan will be delivered and its progress monitored by Fareham's Community Safety Partnership. The Partnership will in turn report back to the Hampshire County Council and the Home Office. As the focus of the Plan is making work more targeted and effective, we will be ensuring that each individual project is fully evaluated to make sure it is helping us meet our goals.

The Plan will be reviewed after six months, at which point any change in priorities and better understanding of what projects work best (or least) will be included in the refreshed version.

Funding arrangements for Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnerships are also changing this year. There has been a move from districts directly receiving an allocation of funds from the Home Office to enable them to finance the work identified by their Plan, to Partnerships bidding from a central pot of money. Access to funds and the questions over the ability to successfully bid from this 'Area Based

Grant' may have large implications on Fareham Community Safety Partnership's ability to meet our identified actions and targets. Our success in delivering against our agreed actions is likely to be hugely influenced by this ability to access funding. This too will be reviewed in our refreshed Plan.
